About the Seminar

Howard University School of Law (HUSL) and Finnegan, Henderson, Farabow, Garrett & Dunner, LLP have collaborated to present the Third Annual Intellectual Property Law Seminar. The two-day program will be held on the campus of HUSL at 2900 Van Ness Street, N.W., Washington, DC.

The continuing convergence of the major forms of IP protection has made it increasingly essential that IP lawyers stay abreast of important developments in multiple areas of IP practice. Today's patent attorney keeps abreast of relevant changes in the copyright law; copyright attorneys often find knowledge of major developments in trademark jurisprudence invaluable in meeting the needs of their clients.

While a single day, dual patent track/copyright trademark track format allows for an efficient, concentrated day of CLE instruction, it also precludes the kind of IP cross-fertilization that many IP lawyers now find vital to their practice.
